## **Greater Cleveland Congregations Delegate Assembly Report**

Thursday evening's meeting (May 24th) took place at Olivet Institutional Baptist Church. After Rev. Colvin's warm welcome we were asked to share our thoughts regarding the criminal justice action held in April. It was easy to agree that Prosecutor O'Malley and Judge Russo came prepared and ready to address our issues. More importantly, they appeared enthusiastic at the prospect of working with GCC in the interest of Greater Cleveland. We have established a working relationship with these key figures, and the "trajectory of our work has changed from impossible to probable," as stated by Rev. Colvin.

James Pearlstein was next up to introduce new staff. First was the reintroduction of Khalilah Worley as the Senior GCC Organizer—this was followed by a loud round of applause. Her focus will be the Strengthening Power Campaign. Barbara Hueter will be the school organizer. Her broad background includes experience as a classroom teacher and a union organizer. Tom Nobbe's corporate and nonprofit experience will be put to good use as our half-time administrative organizer. Our fundraising efforts should soon improve.

Khalilah Worley took some time to explain the "relational power" that GCC has established with the county prosecutor and chief justice. GCC's persistent and consistent organized effort has passed school levies, encouraged Clevelanders to vote, helped expand Medicaid, and shown Cleveland residents that their voice matters. Our goals now include gathering more West Side GCC participation, encouraging more support with the younger population, and recruiting more congregations and institutions. Our work is cut out for us.

Donna Weinberger shared important news on the Do Not Stand Idly By Campaign. Their most recent work is directed at gun manufacturers and important headway was made with Sturm Ruger after shareholders backed an 'Activist Resolution' that would require the company to produce a gun violence report. The shareholders themselves want to see their company take more responsibility for the gun violence problem in the US.

The meeting closed with a tribute to James Pearlstein who will be headed back to Washington. His work with GCC made our organization a formidable player with city leaders. This includes Eric Gordon and the Listen, Act, Win Campaign with Cleveland Schools which made teachers and students aware of their power to change conditions at Collinwood New Tech. We wished him well with a prayer and reception to end the night.

## **SWUU Summer Camp Out at Oak Openings Preserve**

This summer's outdoor adventure will be at Oak Openings Park. This preserve is an oak opening savanna ecosystem. There are woodlands, creeks, wetlands, meadows, and vegetated dunes. The Nature Conservancy listed this as one of the "Last Great Places on Earth." There are prickly pear cactus, wild lupine, sand cherry, and wild orchids. This 5,000 acre park has 50 miles of hiking trails. It is a birders paradise with bluebirds, indigo buntings, whippoorwills, and lark sparrows.

Oak Openings is about 2 hours drive from North Royalton, 122 miles. We have two adjacent group camps with picnic tables and a fire ring. Fire wood is provided. There is running water and flush toilets, but no showers. The sites accommodate up to 10 tents and up to 4 dogs. We will need to register the dogs in advance with breed/ sex/ and up to date vaccinations.

For those who would like to attend the outdoor activities, but not camp in a tent, there are some cabins still available. You will need to reserve these yourself. The cabins sleep up to 5 people. Call 419-407-9710 for reservations. I advise doing this NOW! if you are interested. Cabins go fast.

This annual event is a wonderful way to connect with nature and get to know fellow adventurous congregants. It is primitive camping. Campers are required to bring their own tent, sleeping bag, food, air mattress, cooking utensils, etc. The fee will be \$60, divided by campers. So if we get 20 campers, it will be only \$3 each.

We have been doing the SWUU Camp Out for about 30 years. It is a great way for children to experience nature. Days are usually spent hiking. In the evening we gather around the camp fire and relax. Camp is a good place to walk alone or read in the shade. S'mores usually happen if children attend. We've ( Not including me. I'm not allowed) been known to sing around the camp fire. The good spirits and laughter of campers make it a pleasant experience.

If you enjoy falling asleep in the fresh air with the sounds of katydids and tree crickets and awaking with the sound of songbirds and the scent of coffee wafting through the morning mist, there is a sign- up sheet at church. See Ken Ellis for details

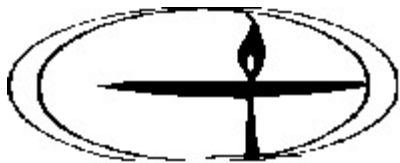
**Katie Maslar** could use a shower of support.
