

Welcome Ali Peters Our New Minister

Ali Peters was born in the village of Corfu in western New York midway between Buffalo and Rochester. When she was two years old, her father was called to be the minister of a Presbyterian church in the small town of Stirling, New Jersey outside the Newark and New York City metropolitan area. Her family which included her mom, dad, and older brother Trevor lived in the manse or house on the church grounds. Ali recalls spending many happy hours riding her bike in the church parking lot and popping into the rectory to visit her dad as he worked.

In high school Ali paraded as a color guard in the marching band, played the tuba in the concert band, and marched in the drum corps which won a world championship.



After college she moved to Philadelphia to work with the girl scout organization as a grant specialist. This office job did not provide the engagement with people that she craved, so after a loathsome year there, she secured a position as a case manager with Big Brothers Big Sisters of America in Newark, New Jersey. After a couple of years in that organization, she decided to try teaching in order to be more engaged and hands-on with children. Her first two years as a teacher were spent as a middle school math instructor in a Newark, New Jersey charter school. The work days were extremely long with no breaks and the work load was overwhelming. Ali recalls leaning heavily upon her Unitarian Universalist church community at that time; and she thanks her mother, who was also a Presbyterian minister, for steering her in the direction of the U.U.'s. For the next two years, Ali was employed as a math teacher by the Plainfield, N.J. school district where she saw clearly the benefits of working under a union contract.

What Ali realized at this point is that she really wants to cultivate a community that empowers its members to wrestle with the big, important life questions in order to create greater depth and meaning in their lives. Thus, in 2017 she began her studies at Union Theological Seminary in New York City and graduated with a Master of Divinity degree with a concentration on Interreligious Engagement. After serving as a student minister at First Unitarian New Jersey in Fanwood, N.J., she served as intern minister then as assistant minister at Fox Valley U.U. Fellowship in Appleton, Wisconsin. It is at this church that she will be ordained on November 12, 2022. More information will be coming on how we can watch Ali's ordination ceremony live that day.

Besides embarking on a new career as the full time minister of our church, Ali exchanged wedding vows this past May with her life partner Justin, who works as a web journalist and critic. They have begun their married life together in Berea, a brand new community for both of them.

May the path they forge together in the future be rich and rewarding, and may Ali's vision of a powerfully engaged church community come to be!

We Celebrate Our Heritage

Thirty-five years ago this November, 31 persons signed the new charter to create our beloved community, SouthWest Unitarian Universalist Church. This year on Sunday, November 6, members and friends are invited to celebrate this important date in SWUU history. Save the date: Sunday, November 6. Details will come later but mark your calendars and plan to join your fellow SWUU community for this special service. We will be marking our founding in 1987, our move to our present church building in 2010, closing the church building and Zooming through the Covid -19 pandemic, and our return to full services. Our membership has grown from 31 to 77 with many friends also joining in worship and activities.

Emily Heath Wilson, a charter member and excellent historian of SWUU, wrote a detailed history of how our community came about.

UU leaders in the Cleveland Metropolitan Area and the Ohio-Meadville District decided to try to start a new congregation in the southwest Cleveland suburbs, an area experiencing significant population growth. Rev. Craig Roshaven, an ordained UU minister, and Carl Kelley, an active layman at West Shore UU Church, were leaders. West Shore pledged \$20,000 in start-up funds.

An advertisement in suburban newspapers announced an organizational meeting for March 8, 1987. Twenty people attended and volunteers planned the first Sunday morning service for May 3 at Zellers Elementary School in Strongsville. Services continued with guest speakers and potlucks in homes during the summer. By fall the charter was ready and 31 people signed the Membership Book. Current members who are also charter members are Keith Matthews, Sherry Spencer, Judith Newell, David Newell, Laura Urbanic, Lee Longo Beuther, William Beuther, Ellen Hansen-Ellis and Kenneth Ellis.

The congregation grew to 50 active members in the church year 1990 – 1991. Meeting in Zellers and then the Strongsville Center School was not an easy arrangement. One annual report describes the process for Sunday morning: "At the appointed time, cars would wheel into the parking lot, trunks would fly open, boxes would appear and out of them would come chalices, hymnals, signs, orders of service and the rest of the accoutrements needed for a Sunday morning service."

When the rent was increased on the Strongsville Center School space, the congregation voted to move to Baldwin-Wallace College's Kulas Hall. The first service was held January 21, 2001. Fundraising included the annual garage sale, sale of Entertainment Books, grocery receipts and airport rides. The Annual Service Auction raised more than \$4,000. Financially, SWUU was in the black.

After 23 years meeting as "the church in a box," as SWUU was fondly called, the congregation found a potential property at 6320 Royalton Rd., North Royalton. The building, built in 1896, had been Disciple Church, most recently a Masonic Temple, and home of the Royalton Players. On September 12, 2010, SWUU held its first service. The dramatically remodeled building was now home for Southwest Unitarian Universalist Church.


