NEOCH educates others about housing issues through outreach collaboration, speakers' bureau programs, shelter advocacy, policy and political action, and training workshops.

Adopt-a-Highway!

I am thrilled to announce that ODOT has finally lifted the suspension on the Adopt a Highway program and we are able to schedule clean-ups. If you have driven by the entrance and exit ramps connecting Pearl Road and I-71, you know that our clean-ups have been sorely missed. I, for one, cannot wait to get out there and beautify our green space which we have been taking care of for 15 years. We will definitely be following the SWUU protocol of being at lease 6 ft away from those with whom we do not live. Because we are not planning to eat, we will not have to worry about the number of people who are involved. If you have never done a highway clean-up with us before, here is what you need to know. We meet at 9:00AM in the parking lot of the Islander Apartments which are located on the east side of Pearl road across from Sunnyside Auto dealership and just north of the I-71 Interchange. The turn is next to a Shell station.

Before we do the clean-up, we put on our vests, take a bag, and (new this year) sign a release form which ODOT requires for every cleanup. Our first clean-up is scheduled for Saturday, May 8th. We are usually finished in about an hour so you can still relax for the rest of the day! There is a short training for anyone who has never participated. If you would like to join us, just text or email and I will come early to do that with any new folks. I hope to seen you there to do our part to take care of the earth and get some exercise at the same time!

News From The Board

Welcome Spring, and the return of hope for better days ahead! I don't know about you, but this recent spell of warmer weather and the appearance of the first flowers of spring have lifted my spirits considerably. Add to that the availability of Covid vaccines for so many, and I feel as if a great weight has lifted. I hope you are feeling more optimistic these days as well.

As you may be aware, we are approaching the end of Rev. Meg's two year contract with us. In a normal year, we would now be undergoing a discernment process that would lead to a congregational vote on whether to approve her as our permanent, or called, minister. But of course, these are not normal times, and because of that, Rev. Meg (with the support of the UUA) has requested that we put that process on hold for a year, and instead extend her current contract through year three. The Board has unanimously approved this proposal. At the same time, in recognition of the excellent work Rev. Meg has done to maintain our beloved community, and to acknowledge her growth as a minister over the last two years, we have approved a 5% raise in salary. We wanted to send a clear message that we are grateful for the commitment Rev. Meg has shown, and are cognizant of the deepening of her ministerial skills. She happily accepted our offer!

On another note, you may recall that we brainstormed ideas at the Congregational Meeting in January for what more we could do during this time of "virtual" meeting. Many excellent ideas were generated, and I am happy to report that the Board is choosing one to proceed with. We plan to create and distribute another SWUU Cookbook (the first one dates back to the 90's). Look for more info. to come, when we ask you to supply your favorite recipes!

Other ideas that may already be in the works, or just need you to get them started:

- Dinner delivery for those folks that can't get out
- Start more Zoom get-togethers
- Encourage members to drop each other e-mail notes of encouragement, or have e-mail pals
- Create a small group that focuses on ways to enhance Zoom services
- Explore and adopt the 8th Principle
- Encourage more members to listen/subscribe to Rev. Meg's morning readings
- Create signs for SWUU windows or out front, offering positive, welcoming messages
- Install a Little Free Pantry, and/or Little Free Library, out front of SWUU
- Look for ways to market SWUU to the larger community
- Make our current YouTube channel more robust
- Create PR releases for local publications or e-zines, for upcoming services, Zoom events, or on what we've been doing during Covid times
- Do a Facebook Live event

"Getting to Know You" Interview by Susan Paxson

Betsy Clark was born in Greenport, NY in northeastern Long Island. Although their family belonged to a Methodist church, she and her sisters attended Catholic school because her parents thought it was better. Her parents owned a seasonal restaurant called The Clam Bar, and this afforded them the opportunity to take family trips on the off season. Their teachers provided schoolwork for them to complete while they were gone. After a difficult transition in the middle of her 7th grade year to a new larger school further west on Long Island called Greenlawn, Betsy spent her middle and high school years participating in lots of music. She played a number of instruments in band, and she also played



piano and sang in and accompanied the high school choir. For her BW audition, she played at Carnegie Hall.

She came to Ohio upon the suggestion by her band director who had also attended Baldwin Wallace College. Her degree in Arts Management led her to work briefly for the Cleveland Opera, but her later work included selling Mary Kay and working for a child care center while she was staying at home to raise her children, Taylor, 29, who lives in PA and Nick, 26, now living in AL. During the kids' early years, they moved around to Tulsa, OK and Dallas, TX, but eventually wound up in Berea, OH and her present position as the Office Manager of Christ United Church in Olmsted Falls.

Bernie Smith was the youngest boy of eleven children and their family lived out in the country in Fremont, Ohio- an hour west of Cleveland. He remembers that they grew a huge garden for their food, and they got meat from the local meat market by cleaning there as a family. He attended a Catholic grade school, but church was a source of conflict because his Lutheran mom had to convert to Catholicism before she married his dad. He also moved to a new school in seventh grade and went to a public high school in Columbia Station, where he learned to play the drums.

When Bernie left home, he worked in the restaurant business as a server and manager for about 10 years and has since been in the printing business for nearly 30 years. Interestingly, his current position is working for churches as a publication support specialist which helps churches produce their weekly printed bulletins. He has a daughter, Julie, who has a PhD in Research Pathology and has recently moved to Columbus, Ohio. He is also an avid photographer and was president of the SW Camera Club for 2 years.

Betsy and Bernie met about 8 years ago on the online dating site called "Plenty of Fish." Bernie stood out to Betsy because he asked interesting questions that reflected that he had actually read her profile! Their first date was meeting for coffee at Panera, and the rest, and they hit it off right away. They now live in the southwest part of Cleveland just over the Parma border in Old Brooklyn. Both still working full time, they treasure spending their evenings and weekends together. They love exploring the city of Cleveland and Bernie has shown Betsy some of the less familiar areas she had never seen. They go to parks, concerts, festivals, and restaurants. Because covid has limited their ability to go out, they have both reconnected to their music by buying new instruments and practicing at home.

Betsy found SWUU first, probably through her daughter Taylor's friendship with Adrienne Ellis. Although Bernie needed a little coaxing, they both decided to join as they appreciate being in a place where people think freely, and choose what they believe. They also like the commitment to social justice that is so prevalent in Unitarian Universalism. Betsy sings in the choir and can't wait until we can sing together again, and maybe Bernie will play the drums!


Sharing and Caring
