Friends,

Happy May to you! I hope that you are living in the present moment as much as possible these days. This May has a bounty of joy to share with you, so don't let it pass you by without stopping for a moment to enjoy and savor the hope that is in the air.

Our worship theme for this month is "Story." We will be sharing our many stories: the stories that define us as a faith community, the stories that define us as a country. For Mothers Day, we will share our "mother" stories in all of their diversity. I would like to encourage you to approach me if you have a story that you would like to share with the congregation by emailing me at minister@swuu.org.

We will also be discussing the stories that we need to let go of and the stories that we may want to inspect and change. The stories we tell about ourselves as individuals and as a community are extremely powerful. It can be healing to take a second look at the stories that we tell about ourselves and to realize that we have the freedom to rewrite them.

An example of rewriting a story that we tell about ourselves might be found in our relationship to nature. For many years, the Judeo-Christian mindset has told us that man has been a destructive and selfish influence on nature. From the story of being expelled from the Garden of Eden all the way to stories that we see on the news now of polar bears stuck on ice floes, we are surrounded by the story that humankind is at odds with nature. What would happen if we rewrote the way that we tell this story? What if we reframed it and told another story?

We could, instead, tell a story of redemption and reconciliation. Let's learn to tell a story where we humans recognize the error of our ways and do better. Let's live out a story that no longer speaks of humankind being at odds with nature, but rather celebrates and highlights our reciprocal relationship with our Mother Earth. In this way, we can turn our stories of sorrow and pain into stories bursting with gratitude and resilience.

I look forward to worshipping online with you this month! I especially look forward to the special conversations that we will be having on May 16 after the service when we will discuss plans and expectations around reopening. In this way, we are creating our own story! All are welcome!

Focus Collection for May: The Edna House for Women

For the month of May the Social Justice Committee researched several organizations that have not previously been supported by SWUU. After careful consideration we selected The Edna House for Women to be the recipient of the May Focus Collection. Like all of the recipients we support, The Edna House is a local 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that aligns with our UU Principles. It is sustained entirely through donations from individuals and corporations.

Founded in 2004, the vision of The Edna House is that "every woman who desires sobriety has the opportunity to achieve it". Their mission is "to give women an opportunity to recover from alcohol and drug addiction by providing a safe, sober place to live and to learn life skills in order to maintain 12-step based sobriety throughout their lifetime". Several aspects of The Edna House Program are ingrained in their mission. Women stay until they are healed. While the program starts with a 6 month stay, there is no maximum length to recovery at The Edna House. They also believe that a woman's ability to pay should not stand in the way of her opportunity to get sober. Additionally, the program is not a one-shot chance. There is no restriction on the number of times a woman can re-enter The Edna House Program.

How do I pay? You will receive an invoice by email with directions on how to pay; but you don't have to wait for the invoice. If you log into the auction website and click on the *My Statement* tab, you will see an itemized list of your purchases and a total amount. You can pay in two ways:

How do I provide the services/items I offered? Log into the auction website and click on the Statement Tab. Scroll down and you will see who purchased your offerings. You can send a group email to all of them, and you can send an individual email by clicking on the buyer's name. The buyer's phone number is provided.

How do I obtain the services/items I purchased? In most cases you will be contacted by the donor. If you have a need to contact the donor, just click on the donor's name on your Statement, and you will be able to send an email. The donor's phone number is also provided. Adopt-a-Highway!

I am thrilled to announce that ODOT has finally lifted the suspension on the Adopt a Highway program and we are able to schedule clean-ups. If you have driven by the entrance and exit ramps connecting Pearl Road and I-71, you know that our clean-ups have been sorely missed. I, for one, cannot wait to get out there and beautify our green space which we have been taking care of for 15 years. We will definitely be following the SWUU protocol of being at lease 6 ft away from those with whom we do not live. Because we are not planning to eat, we will not have to worry about the number of people who are involved. If you have never done a highway clean-up with us before, here is what you need to know. We meet at 9:00AM in the parking lot of the Islander Apartments which are located on the east side of Pearl road across from Sunnyside Auto dealership and just north of the I-71 Interchange. The turn is next to a Shell station.

Before we do the clean-up, we put on our vests, take a bag, and (new this year) sign a release form which ODOT requires for every cleanup. Our first clean-up is scheduled for **Saturday**, **May 8th**. We are usually finished in about an hour so you can still relax for the rest of the day! There is a short training for anyone who has never participated. If you would like to join us, just text or email and I will come early to do that with any new folks. I hope to see you there to do our part to take care of the earth and get some exercise at the same time! It feels great to do something normal for a change!

My Invisible Backpack: Reflections on and Learning About my white Privilege A New Monthly Column in the SWUU Forum by anastasia birosh (they/them)

A little bit about me, I was born white, and raised as female in a very binary world. Binary doesn't fit anymore and neither does white male patriarchy and white supremacist culture. Just so you are aware, the title of this column is inspired by an article penned by Peggy McIntosh called "white Privilege: Unpacking the Invisible Knapsack." (see link at the bottom of this column)

Since, as a congregation we are starting serious discussions about the why's and wherefores of the 8th Principle, and forming the new Antiracism Taskforce Committee, I figure there is no time like the present to begin to share what I've learned and am still learning on my journey to becoming a white antiracist.

I was recently asked: "I know there are many books and resources to read in regards to dismantling racism. What do you think is the best one to start with?" Thinking about my own journey, there simply is not just one book that I can recommend as my journey toward being a white antiracist involved many steps and happened in fits and starts.

In responding to the questioner, I answered:

This is difficult. We all have different learning styles and preferences for the kind of books we read and work through. I have limited it to four titles – all have been important to me on my self reducation journey.

The first book I would recommend is **A People's History of the United States** by Howard Zinn. I will simply say that had I not read this book, my self-examination and understanding would not be where it is today in 2021. This is the book that opened my eyes to the fact that the United States is founded upon the genocide and displacement of Indigenous People. I read the book in 2002 for the first time, and re-read it in 2016.

The second is **Between the World and Me** by Ta-Nehisi Coates. It is said, and I paraphrase, "before you judge a person, walk a mile in their shoes." This book helped me to see the world through a Black father's eyes. Reading this book engaged my heart and my feelings.

The third is **me and white supremacy: Combat Racism, Change the World, and Become a Good Ancestor** by Layla F. Saad. My suggestion is to take time, but not too much and be willing to circle back when memories surface. This book showed me how full of shit I still was and can be.

The last is **The Cost of Privilege: Taking on the System of white supremacy and Racism** by Chip Smith. It helped me see the interconnectedness of white supremacy and capitalism, and how this system keeps on replicating itself.

I concluded my response by writing: "I'm sorry that I just couldn't pick one. You know your own learning style better than me, and that's why I included a bit about why it's on my list."

I hope that you will choose to journey with me toward becoming the Beloved Community. Until next month, Peace.

SWUU VIRTUAL PLEDGE DRIVE

May is the month we hold our Annual Pledge Drive at SWUU. For those who are new or newer, our Pledge Drive accounts for roughly 80% of the revenue income that enables us to enjoy wonderful services, music, terrific religious education programs, spiritual community support to one another, and support to worthy social causes to neighbors in the community at large.

As you know, the past year has been challenging. Due to the pandemic, we couldn't meet in person, and many of us were not able to make or meet our pledge. Offsetting that, our expenses were lower than budget due to the facility closure, careful fiscal management, and the vacant office manager position. In addition, other generous members and friends sent additional monetary gifts. As a result, we are on stable financial footing right now and we don't anticipate having to take money from our reserves to pay our bills and staff salaries. We should just about break even.

A little financial background. Our fiscal year runs from July 1 through June 30. We are completely self-supporting, meaning that all our revenue comes from our members and friends. (Again, 80% of that comes from our Annual Pledge Drive.) We began an endowment a few years ago and we also have CDs in a local bank. We are, however, not a "rich" church and that is why we watch our finances so carefully. In a sense, we live paycheck to paycheck, but we have a safety factor in our reserves. Information on our finances is always available to any member at any time, and there will be a spreadsheet ready for the June congregational meeting so that members are aware of our budget.

As we look forward, we expect to reopen early in the fiscal year. At that point, our expenses will rise to more normal levels. We will probably need to fill the open office manager position. Additionally, we would like to provide more normal salary increases for our staff, who received minimal increases this past year. They have done fantastic work this year to accommodate the needs of SWUU. Rev. Meg, Jenni, Ryan and Kristen pivoted flawlessly to make our community stay as strong and connected as possible during the pandemic.

We ask that you consider the whole of our budget and how you can best contribute. The UU Association recommends 3 to 5% of annual income, but each of us has to consider our own financial situation. If you can increase your pledge, we'd ask that you please do so. If you are unable to increase your pledge, please try to continue the amount of your current pledge. If you have not pledged in the past, please consider making one this year. No matter what the size, all pledges are appreciated. Pledges can be paid monthly, annually, etc.

You'll receive an email the first week of May with the details of how to make a pledge. This year we will be trying to do most of the Pledge Drive virtually and through email. If you have any have questions, please feel free to contact, Lydia Avery.

2021-22 should be a wonderful year of renewal and community for us. I look forward to seeing all of you and being together soon.


