Message from your Minister

Dear Ones,

In the Christian tradition of my heritage, December holds the season of Advent. The word "advent," is derived from the Latin word for "a coming, an approach, or an arrival." In Christian liturgical tradition, the season of Advent is a time of waiting, anticipating, and preparing for the coming of Jesus, whose birth is celebrated on Christmas. However, long before Advent became a part of the Christian calendar, Pagan communities would set aside the weeks before the winter solstice as a sacred time of waiting – waiting, anticipating, and preparing for the sun's return after the longest night of the year. This season calls us into waiting, anticipating, and preparing ourselves for…something.

What a peculiar idea that is. Amid the hubbub leading up to the holidays we are called into a time of waiting, anticipating, and preparing ourselves. Rather than a season of *doing doing doing*, we are called into a way of *being*, a way of being that requires stillness, attention, and openness. It is about being present to the possibility of wonder – whether that wonder arrives with the birth of a baby, the slight and gradual return of the sun, the life-giving power of community and connection, the beautiful design of a single snowflake, or something else entirely. We must be present to these moments if we are to notice that which is wondrous.

As I reflect on this season of waiting, I'm grateful for the words of writer, artist, and minister, Jan Richardson. In her book, *Night Visions* she says:

"The Season of Advent means there is something on the horizon the likes of which we have never seen before. It is not possible to keep it from coming, because it will. That's just how Advent works. What is possible is to not see it, to miss it, to turn just as it brushes past you. And you begin to grasp what it was you missed, like Moses in the cleft of the rock, watching God's hindquarters fade in the distance.

So stay.

Sit.

Linger. Tarry.

Ponder.

Wait.

Behold.

Wonder.

There will be enough time for running. For rushing. For worrying. For pushing. For now, stay. Wait. Something is on the horizon."

That is the blessing I send with you into this season, dear SWUU family. *Stay. Sit. Linger. Tarry. Ponder. Wait. Behold. Wonder. Something is on the horizon.*

Board Happenings by Mike Gold, Board President

I am pleased to announce that Steve Doucette has assumed the position of Treasurer, succeeding Lydia Avery, who has served SWUU in this role for many years. We are so grateful to Lydia for her service and for all she has done to monitor our financial situation as we have grown, added professional staff, and survived Covid. Lydia has worked with Steve (along with Carolyn and our financial consultant Kristen) so there could be a seamless transition. The Treasurer is an important officer position in the church, responsible for keeping the Board of Trustees apprised of SWUU's financial status on a monthly basis.

As most of you know, we were without heat for a week during one of the coldest spells we've had so far this Fall. The heating system now has new heat exchangers and SWUU is warming back up. The repairs by the North Royalton-based company, Sal's Heating and Air Conditioning, were expensive, but the system should be good for many years to come. Because many in the congregation provided space heaters and our Building & Grounds Chair, Dan Paxson, rented and installed a powerful propane heater, we were able to hold Sunday service and Teatime for Peace inperson on November 20.

Teatime for Peace was attended by close to 40 people and left everybody feeling really positive about the connection with our Muslim guests. The event was initiated by anastasia birosh and organized by a group of SWUU folks along with Wali Shariff, of the Ummah Center, Isam Zaiem, of CAIR-Cleveland, and April Stoltz, of Teatime for Peace. Besides great discussion, anastasia read an original poem and Adrienne Ellis and Ellen Hansen-Ellis provided a beautiful musical interlude.

Four Board members attended an online seminar series on Helpful Board Habits and are presenting recommendations to the Board: initiate a Safety & Security Task Force; make Board meeting minutes available on Google Docs; sponsor a Volunteer Fair where people can learn about all the groups and committees at the church and sign up for them; review and possibly update the descriptions for the Board President and Vice-President to reflect the increased role of the VP.

On the Social Justice front, SWUU's support of Urban Hope continues, thanks primarily to the efforts of Jan Wehn, Debby Gorencic and Nancy & Denny Peltola. The Anti-Racism Task Force will be presenting their ideas of ways to implement the 8th Principle at SWUU. Ellen Hansen-Ellis and Susan Paxson are our liaisons to the Greater Cleveland Congregation (GCC) and will be attending a hearing on youth bindovers on December 6. And there is discussion on how to bring more of a culture of engaged social justice involvement to our church.

The Board is planning to sponsor two delegates for online attendance at the 2023 UUA General Assembly June 21-25. The event is in Pittsburgh. If interested in applying to be a delegate, contact Adam Miller. One of the issues being considered will be proposed revisions to Article II of the UUA Bylaws, Principles and Purposes, which is the covenant to which all UUA congregations pledge themselves to. The last time there was a revision was in 1987. The new proposal attempts to incorporate the 8th Principle and suggested edits to some of the other seven principles. Rev. Ali first mentioned this in her 11/20 service. More discussion and info will be coming in the months ahead.

Finally, we celebrate our newly ordained minister, who is now officially Reverend Ali. The ceremony took place on Nov. 12 at Fox Valley UU Fellowship in Wisconsin, where Ali previously served as Assistant Minister. SWUU congratulated Rev. Ali by presenting her with some tree-themed gifts at the 11/20 service, thanks to the efforts of Gay Cady.

Annual Service Auction Saturday, February 4, 2022 In Person Event Starts at 4:30 pm.

After 2 years of pandemic, the Service Auction is coming back as an in-person event! If you have health concerns, don't worry. You'll be able to participate by appointing a proxy, and everyone will be able to bid online on unsold services after the live event.

The Service Auction is our biggest Fundraiser Party of the year. You can expect a Chili Cookoff as a dinner, and fun activities for the whole family including kids! PLEASE, if you have attended the auction party before, spread the word and help new people understand how it works.

Here is the rundown of how SWUU raises money while providing social opportunities. Members and friends decide on an event they would like to organize and host, or a service they can provide. (Things like hikes, dinners, game nights, concerts or sing-alongs at your home or at church, computer service, movie nights, airport deliveries, cleaning or repairs, haircuts, teaching a skill, framed photos or other artwork, backyard BBQs.) At the auction, people sign up for or bid on these services/items. All money raised goes to the Church. No cash changes hands at the auction itself. Once the auction is over, you receive an invoice for your purchases.

Here's the plan:

- During the month of January, congregants can enter their offerings on our auction website as we have done for the past two years.
- During the weeks leading up to the auction, we will be able to see all the offerings on the auction website.
- February 4, Saturday, 4:30 pm. In-person auction. Folks unable to attend may appoint a proxy.
- February 6, Monday. Auction opens virtually. Folks can sign up for unsold services and bid on biddable items on the auction website.
- February 18, Saturday. Auction Closes.

Here's what you can do right now:

- Mark your calendar to save the date: Saturday, February 4 at 4:30 pm.
- Start thinking about what you might offer in the auction.


Sharing and Caring
