Dear Ones,

"New Year, New You!"

That's the promise that we are inundated with at this time of year, right?

"New Year, New You!"

It's a promise that the new year is an opportunity for a clean slate – a chance to reinvent ourselves.

I'm going to spare you my "you are already enough" speech (as true and important as it is), because I get the appeal. It can be nice to have a point in time that we designate as a reset. It can feel helpful to feel like we have a chance at a fresh start every year.

But the truth of the matter is that we are always new and we are always old, aren't we? Our lives constantly reach both forwards and backwards. Backwards our lives reach for roots and memory and context—we reach backwards through our lives, backwards through generations of people who have shaped us. At the same time, our lives are constantly reaching forward toward hope and possibility and what is next. We are born and reborn in every moment—reincarnations of the past that also hold the potential for the future. Always new and always old.

Board Happenings

January is shaping up to be a busy month at SWUU as we begin the second half of the church year. We are planning a State of the Church meeting on Sunday, January 22, after the service, where we will share how we are doing and what we are planning. The Committee on Ministry is working on a survey to get your feedback on how the church is doing and what your priorities are. Please save the date and plan on attending either in person or on Zoom. We need your participation.

The Committee on Ministry is also sponsoring SWUUStories, where folks can share their SWUU stories and the church can create an audio history. This is starting up this month. See the announcement elsewhere in the Forum.

The Anti-Racism Task Force, which worked so hard to inform us all before we voted to approve the 8th Principle, is proposing the creation of a Racial Justice Accountability Committee to carry on this work going forward. The Board has conditionally approved a resolution to accomplish this with the wording to be worked out in the next couple months. Because the creation of a committee needs to be also approved by the congregation, it will be voted on at June's annual meeting.

As of now, our Treasurer is forecasting that we will have to draw money from reserves to meet our spending this year. We are behind in pledge collections from where we were last year and will be raising awareness about pledge commitments as the year progresses. Any gifts to the church are tax deductible. You can also contribute to the church every time you make a purchase on Amazon Smile by selecting SWUU as your charity of choice. The Service Auction, coming up on February 4, is also a great way to give to the church. It's one of the most enjoyable events of the year.

The Board is working on establishing a Safety and Security Task Force to work on best practices for keeping our beloved community safe. Some things are already in the works. On the recommendation of the gas company, Dan Paxson has recently installed a few CO detectors in the building. We will be meeting with the North Royalton Police Department's Community Outreach Officer early this year to go over security procedures.

We are also working on what we're calling a Connection Cafe (Rev. Ali came up with that catchy name), where church groups and committees can explain what they do and attract volunteers. We're hoping to make that happen in March.

Finally, we continue to monitor the status of flu, Covid and RSV cases in our area. We are still

asking folks to be vaccinated and boosted for Covid in order to enter our building and encourage everybody to get vaccinated for flu as well. Masks remain optional at SWUU.

Thank you to our wonderful Collaborative Pianist, Marina Kerze, who had her daughters provide a free piano recital for lucky SWUU attendees recently. Also, thanks to our music committee, choir, choir director Janet Williams and the soloists who have been adding so many great sounds to our halls. Thanks to all those who are filling the seats of our sanctuary inperson and at home on Zoom and to those who have added so much to all of our programming. Happy new year and may 2023 be a healthy and blessed one.

Annual Service Auction Saturday, February 4, 2022 In Person Event Starts at 4:30 pm.

The Service Auction is coming back as an in person event! If you have health concerns, don't worry. You'll be able to participate by appointing a proxy, and everyone will be able to bid on unsold services after the live event.

Here's an overview:

- <u>Friday, January 6</u> congregants can start to enter their offerings on our auction website as we have done for the past two years. You will receive directions via SWUUlist and SWUU News.
- <u>Saturday, February 4 at 4:30 pm. -</u> In person auction. Folks unable to attend may appoint a proxy.
- Monday, February 6 Auction opens virtually for two weeks. Folks can sign up for unsold services and bid on biddable items.

Why Donate and Participate?

The Service Auction is our biggest Fundraiser Party of the year. It's a wonderful way to make new friends and strengthen current friendships. You can expect a Chili Cookoff as a dinner, and fun activities for the whole family including kids! PLEASE, if you have attended the auction party before, spread the word and help new people understand how it works. Not only will this be fun, it's also a critical fundraiser for our congregation.

How it Works

SWUU raises money while providing social opportunities. Members and friends decide on an event they would like to organize and host, or a service they can provide. (Things like hikes, dinners, game nights, backyard BBQs, concerts or singalongs at your home or at church, computer service, movie nights, airport deliveries, cleaning, repairs, haircuts, teaching a skill, artwork or framed photos created by the donor.) At the auction, people sign up for or bid on these services/items. All money raised goes to the church. No cash changes hands at the auction itself. Once the auction is over, you receive an invoice for your purchases.

Before the website even opens, you can think about what you might offer as a service or item.

"Getting to Know You" Interview by Dodi Lettus

Marina Kerze is our very talented Collaborative Pianist. She was born in the former USSR and lived in the city of Perm in the Ural region. When she was 22, Marina contacted Margarita Shevchenko, then a member of the Cleveland Institute of Music (CIM), and asked Shevchenko to accept her as a student. Ms. Shevchenko offered Marina a scholarship if she would move to the US. Marina left her homeland and came to Cleveland on her own to study with this internationally renowned pianist. She earned a Masters of Piano Performance at Cleveland State University and studied at Oberlin Conservatory, earning an Artist Diploma there.



Marina comes from a diverse religious background—her mother is Russian and an Orthodox Christian, her father an Orthodox Jew. Marina puts her heart and soul into helping others and loves sharing the beauty of music and performing. Raising her children and passing on the traditions, culture, and knowledge to the next generation is Marina's main purpose at this time.

Marina and her husband David are parents to two very talented daughters, Sabrina (11) and Dianna (9) both of whom thrilled an enthusiastic audience at SWUU in December, playing an amazing classical piano repertoire that included Debussy, Haydn, Beethoven, and Liszt. Her son, Filipp, age 1 ½, is not playing an instrument yet, but who knows what the future may hold?

She said that SWUU "feels like home". Marina enjoys being able to play a wide repertoire and finds peace and enjoyment playing the piano at SWUU. In addition to working at SWUU, Marina works at Westlake Music Academy teaching piano, and teaches private students. She has traveled to Italy and Israel where there is "history in every inch". Marina and her daughters enjoy cooking, particularly healthier food, gluten-free, and sugar-free. Thank you Marina, for sharing your love of music with us!
