In June, our worship theme is Delight. Someone who teaches me so much about delight is the poet, Mary Oliver. In that spirit of delight, I offer you this excerpt from Mary Oliver's poem "To Begin With, the Sweet Grass":

II.

Eat bread and understand comfort. Drink water, and understand delight. Visit the garden where the scarlet trumpets are opening their bodies for the hummingbirds who are drinking the sweetness, who are thrillingly gluttonous.

For one thing leads to another. Soon you will notice how stones shine underfoot. Eventually tides will be the only calendar you believe in.

And someone's face, whom you love, will be as a star both intimate and ultimate, and you will be both heart-shaken and respectful.

And you will hear the air itself, like a beloved, whisper: oh, let me, for a while longer, enter the two beautiful bodies of your lungs.

This is one of those passages that I like to read over and over and over and over and over and over whenever I come across it. I keep re-reading it until it feels like a prayer that moves me through my day. Perhaps you may want to try letting it do the same for you and see what happens.

As summer begins, our church year is drawing to a close, which means our annual meeting is upon us. Please mark Sunday, June 18 on your calendar (see agenda elsewhere in the Forum). We need your attendance and participation in approving a new Board of Trustees, the Racial Justice Accountability Ministry (formerly the Anti-Racism Task Force), a revised Land Acknowledgment, and our 2023-24 Budget. Let us also gather to celebrate what a wonderful year this has been now that we are back together in person. We have a dynamic new minister in Reverend Ali, an amazing RE Director/ Office Administrator in Carolyn, a pianist in Marina, who fills our sanctuary with heavenly sounds, and a choir led by Janet Williams that also fills our halls with beautiful music. And how fortunate are we to have so many volunteers donating time to groups and committees and caring and hospitality and grounds maintenance and Sunday services, both in person and online? When I hear the stories of how so many UU Churches are struggling post-Covid, I count the blessings we have here at SouthWest UU.

In other news...

SWUU has participated in Cleveland's Pride Day for many years. Deb Celinski is organizing our participation for the Saturday, June 3 march downtown. If you are interested in joining in, please contact Deb. We have a new banner that will be rolled out for the event donated by Deb and designed by Deb and Sharron Abbey. This is a great opportunity to celebrate and support our LGBTQ+ community and promote fair and just treatment for all. Rev. The Board of Trustees has adopted a budget for next year that is expected to run a deficit. While we have the reserves to cover this, there is hope that cost savings and increased pledges and membership will grow in the years ahead. Despite our tight budget, the Board approved a 6% cost of living increase for our minister and staff. We felt it important to show support for who they are, what they do, and help out with the rising cost of living. Many thanks to our Treasurer, Steve Doucette, on his work in preparing and presenting the budget.

The UUA General Assembly, which is the UUA's Annual Meeting, is June 21-25 in Pittsburgh. We will be represented by Rae Brewer and anastasia birosh, as well as Reverend Ali. One of the major discussions will concern revisions to Article II. Rae and anastasia have held a couple meetings to explain the revisions and hear feedback. Please contact them if you would like to know more.

The Racial Justice Accountability Ministry conducted two inspiring discussion sessions on the UUA's Common Read, Mistakes and Miracles: Congregations on the Road to Multiculturalism, by Nancy Palmer Jones and Karin Lin. The book shares the experiences of five diverse congregations as they journey to create multicultural, anti-racist Beloved Community. Even if you missed the discussions, the book is compelling reading and an excellent way to learn about the challenges and value of working to achieve one's mission.

In Religious Exploration news, Carolyn, Rev. Ali and others are taking the Coming of Age class on a field trip to Cincinnati on June 2 to visit the Holocaust Museum and Freedom Center. Carolyn and Rev. Ali are also working on plans to set up a kids play area in the sanctuary.

In closing, I want to celebrate and remember the amazing services we had in May, beginning with the Music, Poetry and Art Sunday organized by the SWUU Music Team. That was followed by the service led by Rae Brewer and anastasia birosh on "Imagining a Future for Our Faith," where they presented the ideas of the UUA's Article II Study Commission. On May 21, Rev. Ali led us in a "Flower Ceremony," marking the 100th anniversary of this tradition begun by Unitarian minister Norbert Capek. Finally, Chaplain Ian Anderson presented a service on how creativity and expression contribute to the infinite expansion of our universe. Let us all celebrate what has been and look forward to what is to come.

Annual Meeting Ballot Items

Anti-Racsim Task Force Becomes Racial Justice Accountability Ministry

On the ballot for the upcoming Annual Meeting is a proposal to affirm the Racial Justice Accountability Ministry (formerly known as the Anti Racism Task Force) as a congregational committee.

The Anti Racism Task Force, formed in 2020, fulfilled its mission to have SWUU adopt the 8th Principle. Because a task force is meant to be short term, they would like to continue this work as a permanent committee approved by the congregation to help SWUU live into the 8th Principle. The Racial Justice Accountability Ministry (RJAM) hopes to do this through education, discussion, and an audit of our policies, by-laws, and practices that will hopefully lead toward a more multicultural, antiracist, and just beloved community.

The Board of Trustees has voted to support the adoption of RJAM as a committee. It is the hope of the Board that the congregation will also vote to support this.

Land Use Acknowledgement Becomes Fully Congregational

The following statement is read monthly at the beginning of our Sunday services. At the annual meeting there will be a vote on adopting this land use acknowledgment as a congregation. Until now, it has been a statement adopted only by SWUU's Worship Associate team.

Land Use Acknowledgement

We, the members of Southwest Unitarian Universalist Church, acknowledge that our building sits on land in the state now known as Ohio. We are guests of the traditional stewards of this land.

Ohio is the traditional territory of different indigenous tribes and nations, including the Delaware, Lenape ([Len-a-pee], which roughly translated means The People), Shawnee, Wyandot, Miami, Ottawa, Potawatomi [Pot-a-watt-a-me], Erie, Eel River, Munsee, Mingo, Sauk, including the Annishnabe aka Ojibwe or Chippewa, Kickapoo, Wea [Why-a], Piankashaw [Pie-ank-sho], and Kaskaskia [Kas-kas-kia], Catawba, and Tuscarora. Later the Seneca and even the Cherokee made their way to Ohio - which, by the way, is based on a Shawnee word.

Indigenous people are still here despite ethnic cleansing, forcible removal, unrecognized sovereignty, and outright denial of their existence. Land acknowledgment is just a first step towards healing. Colonialism is a current ongoing process, and we need to be aware and build mindfulness of our present participation in it.


