#### Message from your Minister

#### Welcome

Dear Ones.

Our worship theme for September is "Welcome." As I wrestle with this theme and all it can teach us, I find myself thinking about everything in life that I don't feel welcoming toward. Those things, feelings, people and experiences that I struggle to welcome. Sometimes with good reason (like when something causes harm). Sometimes because I just simply feel resistant.

But welcoming can be a spiritual practice.

I'm very grateful to my beloved colleague at the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Cleveland, Rev. Randy Partain, who shared with me a guided meditation that they adapted from a Jesuit prayer. It serves as a great practice of welcoming – and of the letting go that welcoming might require.

I invite you into this practice with me. Find a comfortable position, wherever you are. Settle into your body. And follow along:

#### **Welcoming Reflection**

First, we feel whatever emotions we feel completely—including their connection with our physical feelings.

We don't judge or try to change them.

We just feel them.

Second, we say:

Welcome, Welcome, Welcome,

I welcome everything that comes to me today, because I know it is useful to me in my journey.

I welcome all thoughts, feelings, and emotions.

*I welcome all persons, situations, and conditions.* 

I welcome reality as it is in this moment, even as I welcome the possibility for change.

Then, we let go:

I let go of my attachment to power and control.

I let go of my attachment to affection and pleasure.

I let go of my attachment to esteem and approval.

I let go of my attachment to survival and security.

I let go of my attachment to how change must happen.

I let go of my attachment to how I must change.

I open to the presence of love and wholeness within me.

Last, we open:

I open to the connection of my innermost being and I open to the guidance of my deepest, life-affirming values.

Amen and Blessed Be.

May we cultivate this practice of welcome, dear ones. May we let it transform us.


## **Sharing and Caring**
