
Message from your Minister Report on General Assembly 2024

Beloveds,

Every year Unitarian Universalists from around the country gather in June for the Unitarian Universalist Association's annual General Assembly (GA). This is an important time for connection with the larger UU movement and for delegates from all UU congregations to conduct the business of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA). This year's general assembly was held completely online – a format that we'll see every few years moving forward, in order for it to be more accessible.

When it came down to business, this general assembly was a big deal! Here is some of what occurred:

- 1. Delegates voted to approve the proposed revisions to Article II of the UUA by-laws! At SouthWest UU, we have explored this proposal at length over the past couple years and now it is official. With these revisions, we as Unitarian Universalists proclaim a set of shared values with LOVE at the center. I encourage you to read through these revisions here: https://bit.ly/4cFyXmw
- 2. Delegates voted to affirm three "Actions of Immediate Witness" (AIWs) for our UU Association this year. These AIWs name three urgent social justice priorities for our association to take action on: Solidarity with Palestinians; Centering Love Amidst the Ongoing Impact of Covid-19; and World on Fire: Humanitarian Work and Climate Change. - 3. Delegates voted to pass a business resolution entitled "Embracing Transgender, Nonbinary, Intersex and Gender Diverse People is a Fundamental Expression of UU Religious Values." I encourage you to read this resolution here: https://bit.ly/3VLAAIi
- 4. Delegates also voted to pass a responsive resolution, "UUA General Assembly Support for October 7 Hostages." I encourage you to read this resolution here: https://bit.ly/4eEURrH


Sharing and Caring
