Trying Softer

Dear Ones,

I've been grieving the death of my favorite poet, Andrea Gibson. They died on July 14, 2025.

I've always appreciated poetry here and there, but Gibson is the poet who really made me get poetry – why it is important, how beautiful it can be, and how it can bring us to truths deeper than we knew were possible. Their work is soulful and generous and honest and full of love. And they aren't just *my* favorite poet – their life and their work has meant so much to so many people. On the day they died, my newsfeeds and algorithms made it feel like the entire internet was grieving along with me.

In the weeks since their death I have been re-reading their work and sharing pieces of theirs with loved ones in tribute to them. Their words have been living on my heart and, right now, these particular words from their poem, "The Year of No Grudges," keep coming up for me:

I know most people try hard to do good and find out too late they should have tried softer.

I wonder, what might it look and feel like for you to "try softer," beloveds? Where can you inject softness into your life?

May we all experiment with trying softer. With so much gratitude to those who, like Andrea, have lovingly modeled that softening along with the power and wisdom that comes with it.

Greater Cleveland Congregations Update

Yesterday was our monthly Engage GCC meeting at Olmsted Community Church (the newest member of GCC). It was rather nice to be on the west side, although, from Parma Hts, it still took me almost a half hour to get there. It was not quite as convenient as the meeting in June at our own space in North Royalton. GCC is growing slowly, and more west side churches are joining. If you have a good friend who belongs to a church around here, reach out to them . Tell them about GCC, especially if they are interested in Social Justice. They could contact me if they want to find out more, and they could attend a meeting with me to see for themselves!

Some of the updates they shared at this meeting are:

Pretrial Justice: working to identify individuals with expertise in conducting relational meetings. The team's research has shown that the way the justice system is working with these individuals is not lessening the time that people are incarcerated before they even have a trial. Also, they are planning a fall action and invite judicial candidates. I will let you know about that date, ASAP, because usually they want a lot of people to attend these actions. If you have an interest in getting involved in pretrial justice, contact me and I will put you in touch with members of the team.

Crisis Diversion Center: There is a new behavioral Health and Addiction Center which will open in 2026. This means that the Cuyahoga County Diversion center that GCC advocated for starting almost 10 years ago, will close. The new center will have all of the services of the old one, but will include law enforcement drop-off without a prescreening. GCC has always advocated for this, and is very much in favor of the new center. It will include 24-hour crisis intervention, longer term stays, pharmacy, adolescent urgent care, detox, and more, all in one place. It also will have the capability for stabilization in a locked unit which is rarely needed, but beneficial, because law enforcement is more likely to use it, which will keep more people out of jail.

Battle For Democracy: Cleveland lost two wards in the last census, so there will be some important city council races this fall. The team is planning an action around two specific races, where two incumbents will be competing for the position. One of these wards is the Lee-Harvard neighborhood where we are working on our healthy blocks initiative. Presently this initiative is on hold as they secure funding after the current administration's federal cuts to medicaid.

The next GCC meeting will be the fourth Thursday in August (August 28th at 7 pm) and I would love to have someone attend with me! It will be at Forest Hill church in Cleveland Heights. Finally, if you cannot participate in any of the initiatives the GCC is working on, due to time constraints, or distance away, they can also use our financial donations. This is another way that we can support social justice issues in the city of Cleveland. GCC, like any other non-profit organization runs on a tight budget, and they spend their money to keep their organization going, just like our own church!

The Who, When and Why of our beautiful garden was the vision and crafting of our


beloved member David Slawson. Known worldwide as a master Japanese garden designer/architect extraordinaire.

North Royalton...a thing of beauty, a joy forever!






Sharing and Caring
