### Message from your Minister

### Hope

Dear Ones,

On a few different occasions recently, someone at church has asked me "What is December's worship theme?" And when I have provided the answer, "Hope," that person has reacted with a big exhale, saying something like "Oh boy, we need some of that these days, don't we?"

Yes, we do. And the good news is that hope is here for us.

In fact, hope is an inherent part of our Unitarian Universalist faith. UU theologian, James Luther Adams, laid this out for us when he wrote about what he called the "Five Smooth Stones of Religious Liberalism." These were the five things needed to carry a liberal faith forward. When speaking about these "smooth stones," he spoke of possibility, respect, justice, agency, and last but not least, hope. He said:

[L]iberalism holds that the resources (divine and human) that are available for the achievement of meaningful change justify an attitude of ultimate optimism. Hope.

And Luther Adams was not writing this from a perspective of sheltered naïvete. He had lived through World War II and his theology was shaped by seeing the horrors of fascism and Nazism up close.

And still, he lifts up hope as core to his faith—both his own faith and our collective faith.

Our faith declares that we have the resources for meaningful change.

This point from James Luther Adams has always reminded me of one of my favorite quotes about hope – this one coming from my mom, Rev. Barbara Peters. This came from a sermon where, unlike Luther Adams, she made a distinction between optimism and hope:

My vote is on the side of hope which wins over optimism every time. You see, there is a difference between optimism and hope. Optimism hangs on to whatever can be gleaned from a situation as good. Hope, on the other hand, focuses on a different direction. Hope focuses on the power of God's love to see us through and transform us. Optimism can waiver, hope never fails. Optimism may help for the short-term, hope is what we need for the long haul.

Whether or not you, yourself, believe in God, the message here is powerful. Hope lies in the power of Love to see us through and transform us. We have the resources for meaningful change.

May we know this hope, beloveds.

- The SWUUber ride service will be back for those who need transportation to the event!


